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**Gov. Noem Announces \$2.52 Million for Marion Water, Storm Water, and
Wastewater Improvements**

PIERRE, S.D. – Gov. Kristi Noem says the state Board of Water and Natural Resources has approved a \$2,520,000 funding package for Marion to make drinking water, storm water, and wastewater improvements.

The funding package includes a \$420,000 loan from the Clean Water State Revolving Fund, a \$865,000 Consolidated Water Facilities Construction Program grant, and a \$1,235,000 loan from the Drinking Water State Revolving Fund with \$325,000 in principal forgiveness. Loan terms are 2.125 percent for 30 years for the Clean Water State Revolving Fund loan and 1.875 percent for 30 years for the Drinking Water State Revolving Fund loan.

The funding package will be administered through the Department of Environment and Natural Resources.

“I am pleased to announce that Marion will receive this assistance,” said Gov. Noem. “This funding will help the city complete needed upgrades to its water and wastewater systems to better serve its customers and protect the environment.”

The City of Marion is planning a phased, infrastructure improvement project along Broadway Avenue. Phase one improvements include replacement of approximately 1,050 feet of vitrified clay storm sewer pipe, replacement of compromised sections of vitrified clay wastewater pipe, and replacement of approximately 1,750 feet of cast iron water mains with non-corrosive PVC pipe.

The funding package along with local funds will cover the total cost of the project.

The Consolidated Water Facilitates Construction Program, funded in part by revenues from the Petroleum Release Compensation Tank Inspection fee and the sale of lotto tickets, provides grants and loans for water, wastewater and watershed projects.

The State of South Dakota and the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency fund the Clean Water State Revolving Fund Program, which provides low-interest loans for wastewater, storm water and nonpoint source projects.

The State of South Dakota and the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency fund the Drinking Water State Revolving Fund Program, which provides low-interest loans for public drinking water system projects. Principal forgiveness is a subsidy option that results in a reduced loan repayment amount for the borrower.
